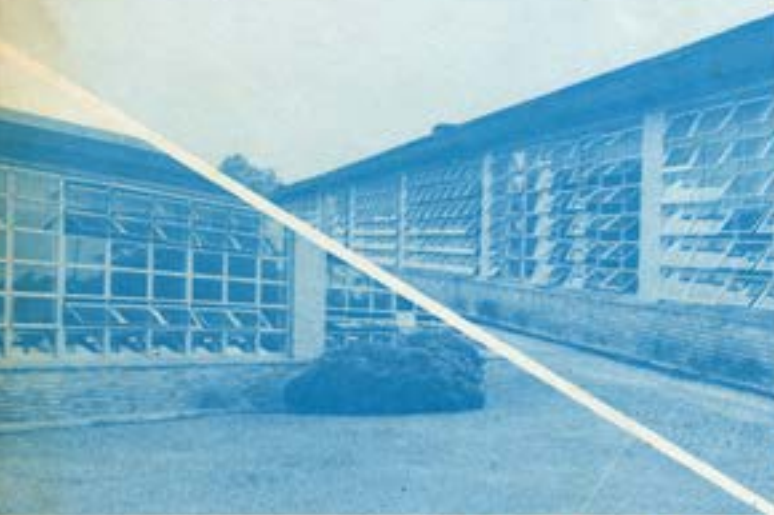
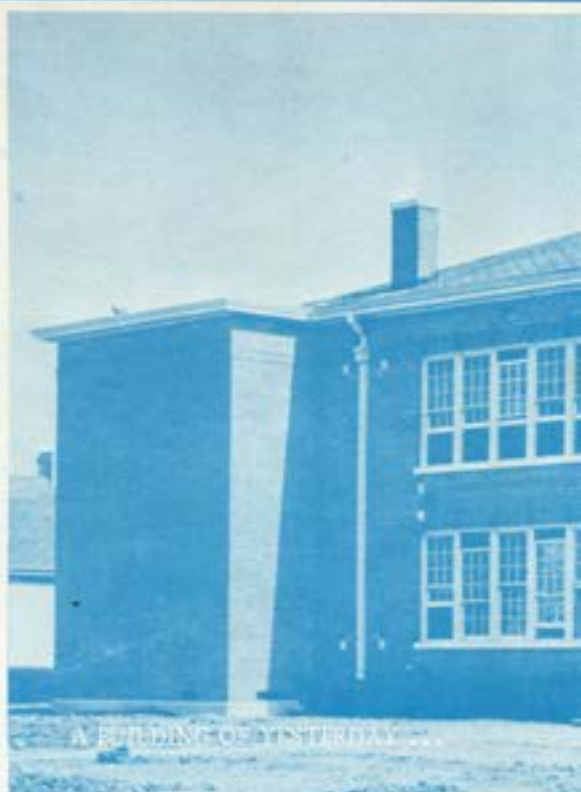


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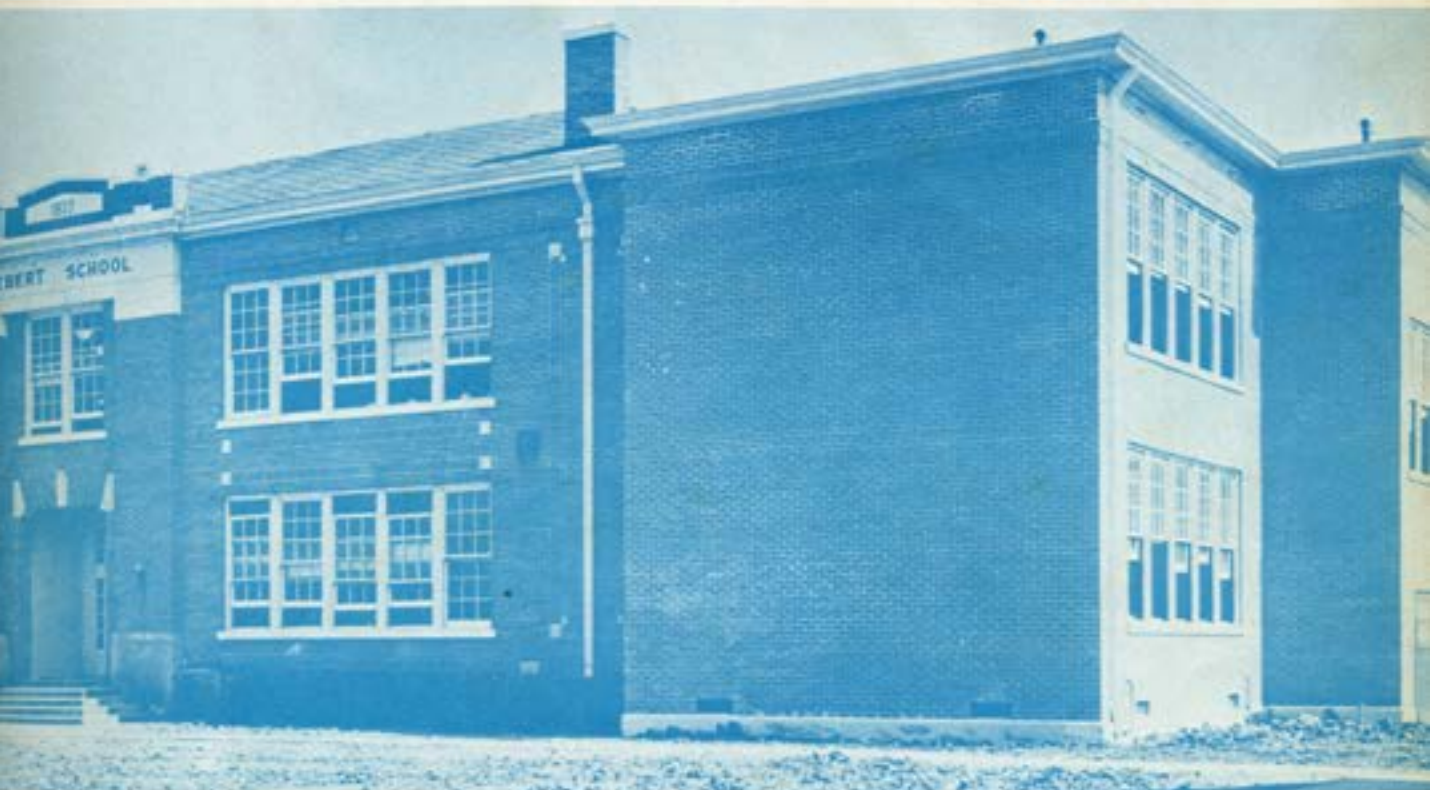

THE LATE LT. JOSEPH MELONSON

HE SERVED HIS COUNTRY

1ST LT. JOSEPH DUDLEY MELONSON, JR., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Melonson of 4445 Booker Street, was killed in Viet Nam in May, 1969.

THE PANTHER STAFF recognizes Lt. Melonson, as a son of Hebert High School. He served his country diligently in war and gave his life. This was the highest service a man could pay to his country. As a PANTHER star in football, basketball and track, and as a scholar, he successfully completed his high school term. Seeking higher knowledge, he attended Lamar College of Technology, and studied biology until his junior year. Then, he was inducted into the United States Army.

After performing outstanding duties in basic training at Ft. Polk, La., he was honorably advanced to Officers' Training School at Fort Benning, Georgia. He was married to Miss Camille Charlton on June 8, 1968. He was a life-time member of Our Mother of Mercy Catholic Church. Because of his fine display of military leadership, he was the recipient of the Gold Star.

THE HEBERT STORY

It is often said that necessity is the mother of invention. Yet, the largest room in the world is the room for improvement.

Long before public schools existed in Texas, the need existed for men and women to be educated in order that they might fulfill their desired goals in life. Reading, writing, thinking logically, figuring and the learning of skills could improve their understanding, their economic conditions and help them to gain power and dignity. ... Thus, the need, KNOWLEDGE ... the invention, A SCHOOL ...

About 1880, Professor A. J. Criner of Georgia organized a small school in a little frame building owned by Mr. Harry Hall, in the southwestern part of Beaumont. At that time, Mr. Criner was the only teacher and the equipment was poor, but he endured this condition until 1883.

During that year, Mr. Zillian Blanchette donated a portion of his property on Anderson Street, (now known as Avenue B), for a school building. His two brothers, Mr. Ozen Blanchette and Mr. Usan Hebert, assisted in constructing a frame building. Mr. Criner moved into the new building and made up the census roll, which was still small. The school became known as the Prairie View Colored School.

A few years later the school began to grow, as more families moved into the area, and a large room was added to the school building to accommodate the enrollment. More teachers were needed also, and Mrs. H. B. Blanchette, (mother of the late Mrs. H. I. Castile, Mr. M. H. Pender, and Mr. J. H. Golphin were added to the faculty.

In 1906, Mrs. Blanchette resigned and the late Mr. John P. Odom was added to the faculty. Later, Mr. Criner died and Mr. Odom became the principal the same year. During this same time, Mrs. Nettie E. Denson, a Beaumontian was employed.

In 1909, the scholastics increased to an extent that a new site for a larger school building was necessary. Again, Mr. Usan Hebert and Mr. Ozen Blanchette, (brother), who had formerly purchased a seventy-five acre tract of land sold one acre each and donated one acre each for a new school. The streets surrounding the school were named for them and their children. Others who contributed money and labor to help build a new school were the late Mr. Elmo Willard, Mr. H. C. Tappen, Mr. Van Washington, and Mr. Nelson Gentry.

Upon the donated plot, the first two-room brick building was constructed. Professor John P. Odom, Miss A. M. Blanchette, and the late Mrs. Eugene were teachers in the new school, which became known as the South Park Colored School, having been incorporated by the South Park District. Then a number of citizens were named as trustees of this area. They were Mr. Usan Hebert, Mr. Ozen Blanchette, Mr. Louis Pender, Mr. V. H. Bailey, Mr. H. C. Tappen, Mr. Will Blanchette, Mr. A. A. Hebert and Mr. Van Washington.

In 1912, the school expanded again and more rooms were added to accommodate a larger enrollment and to add additional grades. Teachers employed that year were Miss Mattie Tappen (today known as Mrs. Mattie Norton, retired), Miss Rosa Bailey (now Mrs. R. L. Flanders, retired), and Mrs. Vera Lee Blanchette Vallier, (retired also). Grades one through seven were taught.

In 1917, a two-room frame building was added and Mrs. C. Hodge, Mrs. Carrie Clark, (deceased), and Mrs. Elouise Alexanders replaced Mrs. Leola Collins, Mrs. Vera Vallier resigned and her sister, the late Mrs. Hazel I. Castile, replaced her.

Through the efforts of the late Superintendent L. R. Pietzch and the Board of Education the school continued to progress. In 1922, a six-room two story brick building with a principal's office was added. A new name was then given to the school and it became known as the Hebert School.

In 1923, music was taught part-time by Miss A. Goodman. In 1925, Manual Arts were taught part-time by Professor Charlie Harrison, and in 1926, Home Economics was added to the curriculum and Miss Julia Robinson was the first teacher of Home Economics. During this same year, the Misses Florence Thompson, Lola Williams, (retired), and Louise Graham, now Mrs. Louise Taylor (retired), were employed.

In 1928, Professor John P. Odom, the principal died and Mr. U. S. Blanks, Manual Training teacher, who had replaced Mr. Charlie Harrison, was promoted to principalship.

The school continued to progress and in 1931, a four-room stucco building was erected to take care of the increased enrollment. During this year, Miss Warine Sprott and Miss Laverne Carson replaced Miss Julia Robinson who taught Home Economics. Other teachers employed this time were Mrs. Hattie Blanks, Mr. Albert Burks, and Mr. R. L. McGowan. In the same year, Mrs. Louise Taylor organized a classroom-library. This was Hebert's first library and it remained in her classroom until 1941 when the Board of Education had extensive additions and renovations made to accommodate the growing school. Then the auditorium in the main building was partitioned into four classrooms and a study-hall library was provided. Miss Cormier was employed as the first librarian.

In 1936, Principal U. S. Blanks died and Mr. R. L. McGowan, a science teacher, became principal from 1936 to 1946. During this span, many new courses were added to the curriculum including Negro History and Negro Literature. Additional teachers were hired: Mrs. Thelma Stanmore, Miss Mable Peterson, Miss Hattie Horton, Mr. Marion Lervis, Mr. Clisby Tarver, Mr. Green Mayfield, Mr. Henry Williams and Mr. Jacob Blanchette were added to the faculty.

Dedication ceremonies for the million dollar Hebert High School on Fannett were held on February 10, 1957. Professor A. L. Price was principal and J. J. Vincent was superintendent of the South Park Independent School District.

Today, Hebert High has grown tremendously. It is composed of multiple buildings where students can get a broad education. Professor James F. Jackson is the present principal. He succeeded the late Professor A. L. Price who died in 1969.

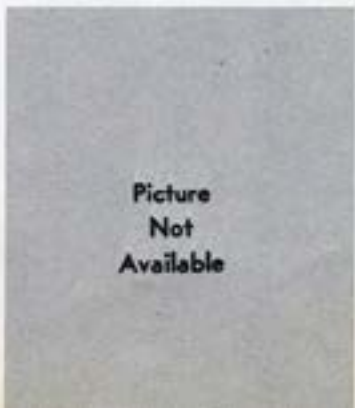

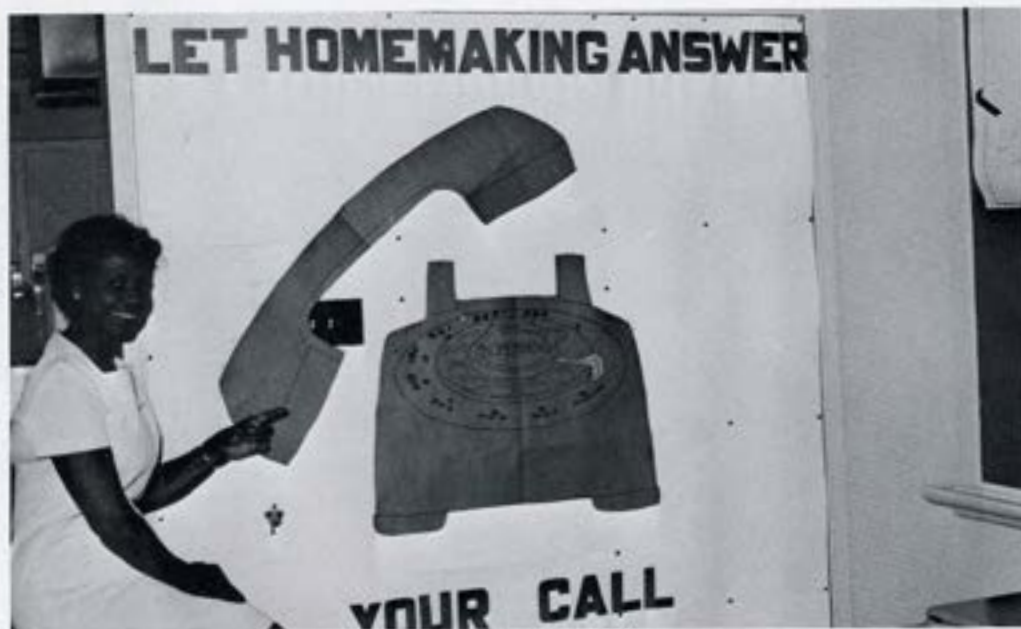

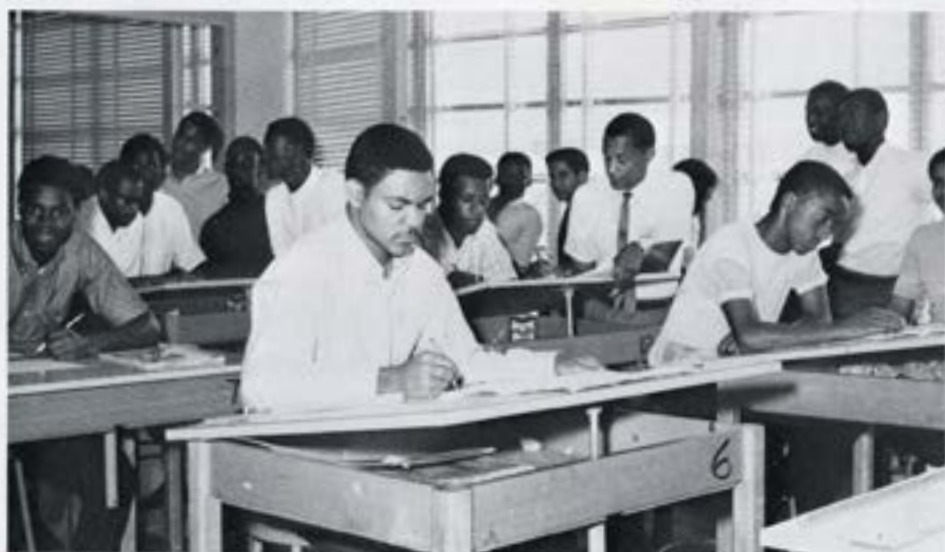

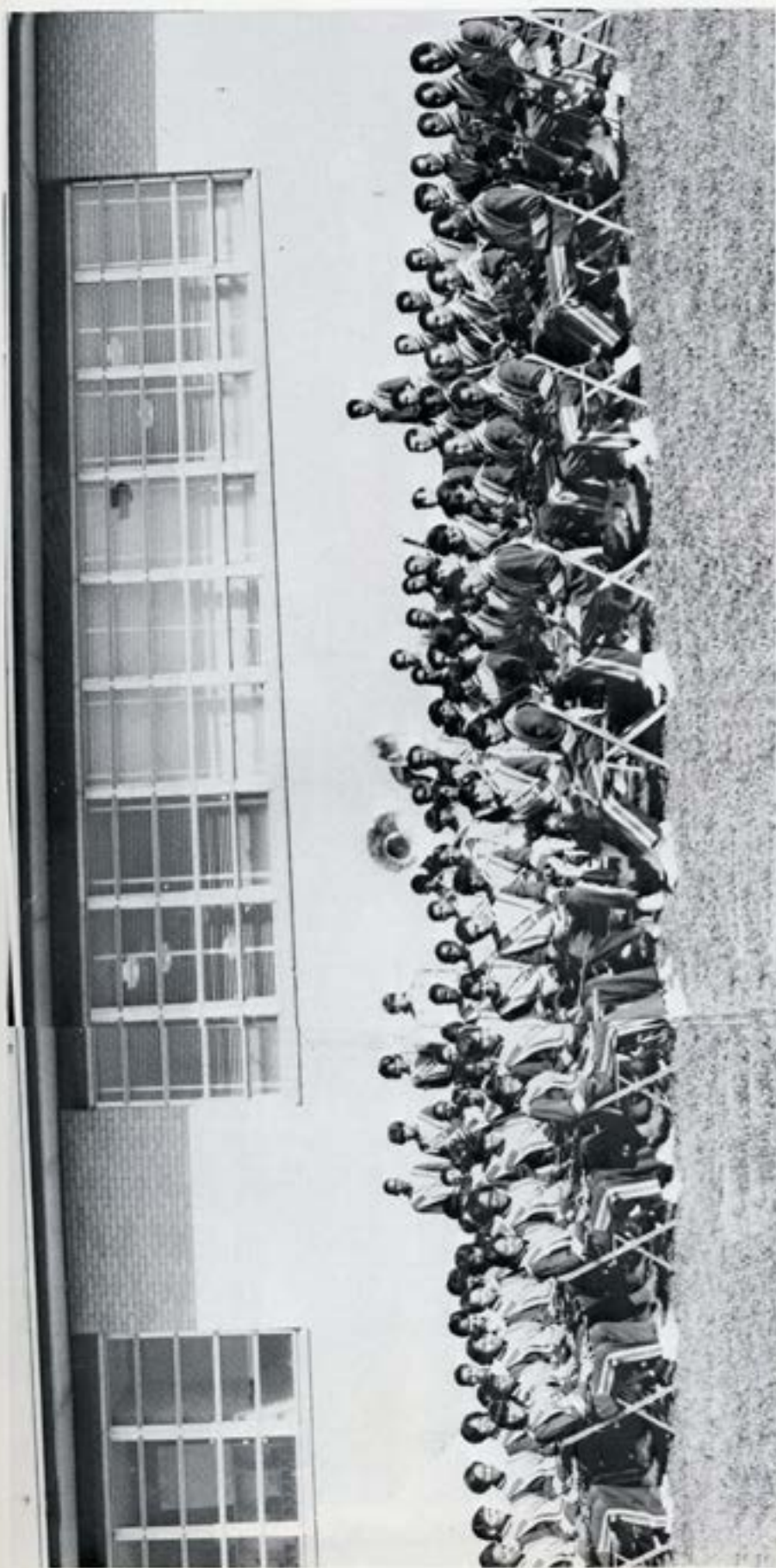

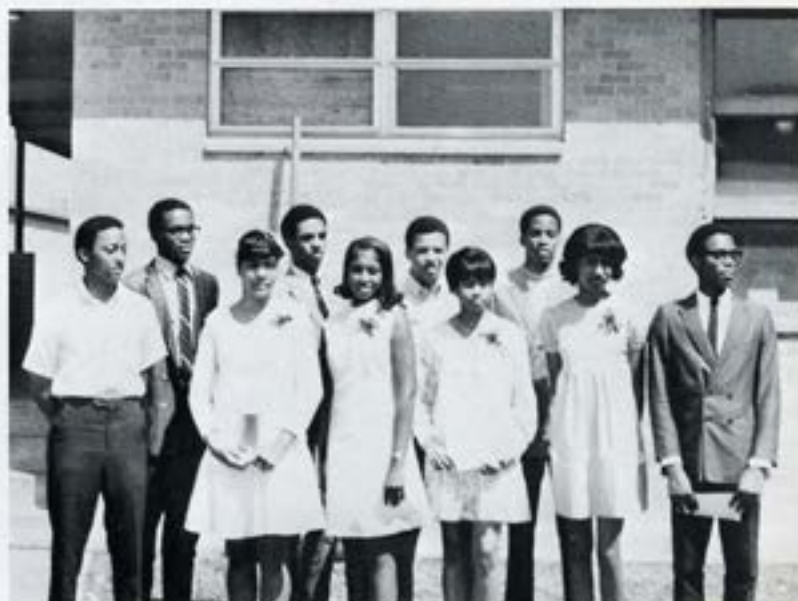

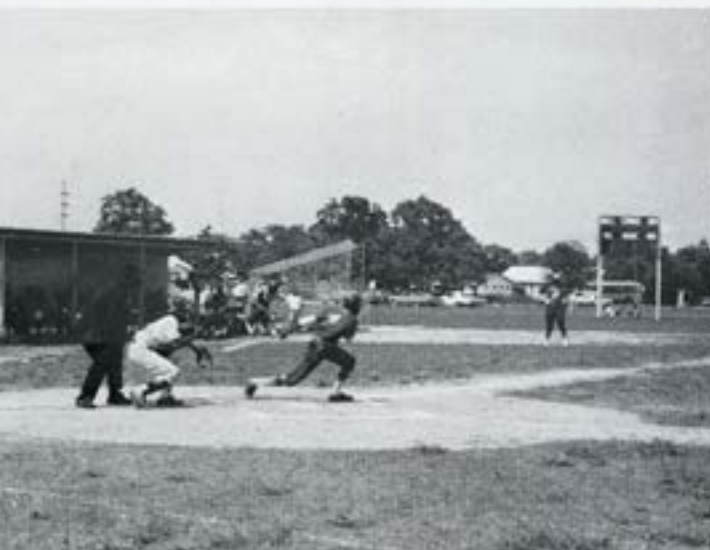

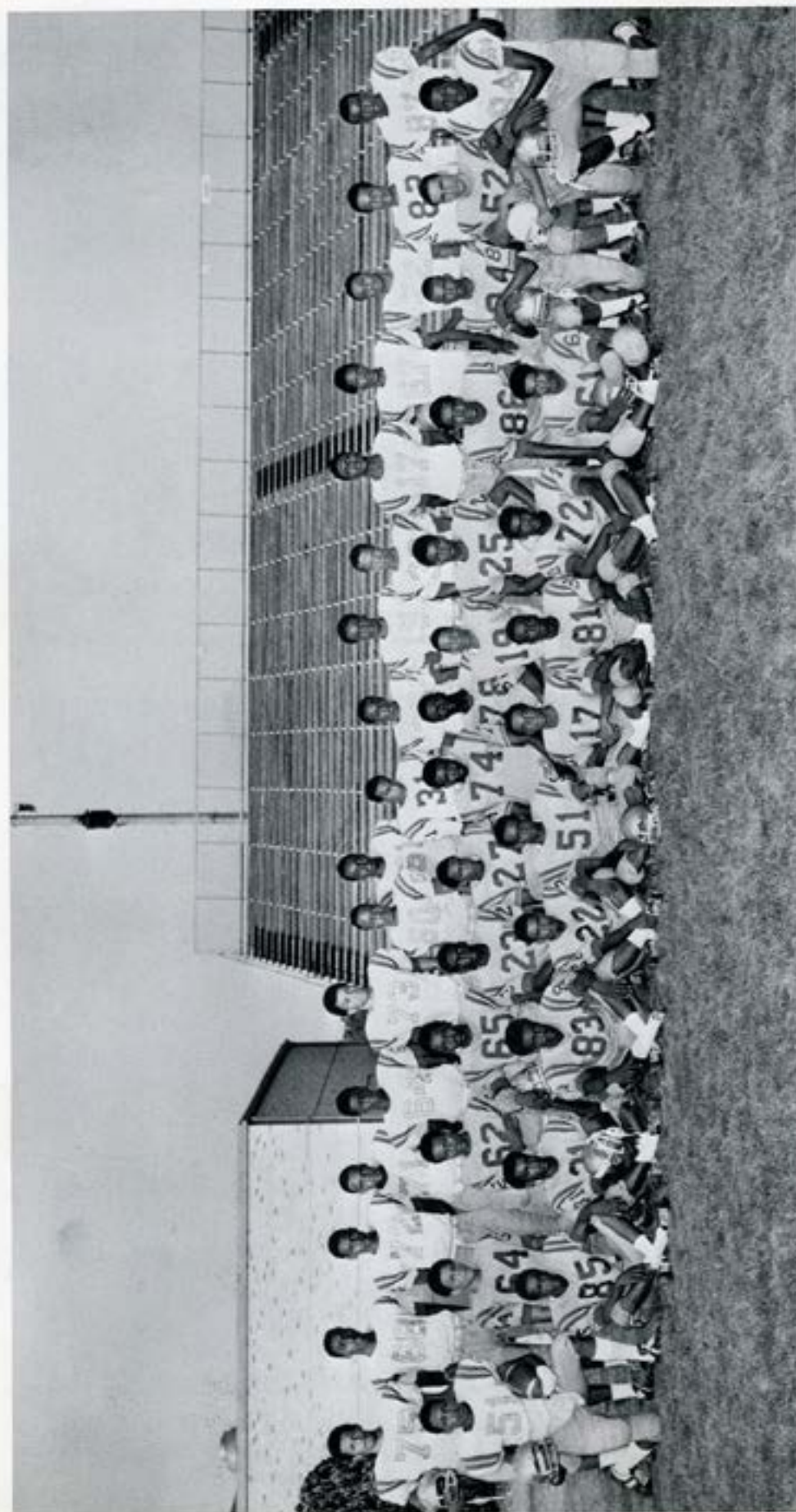

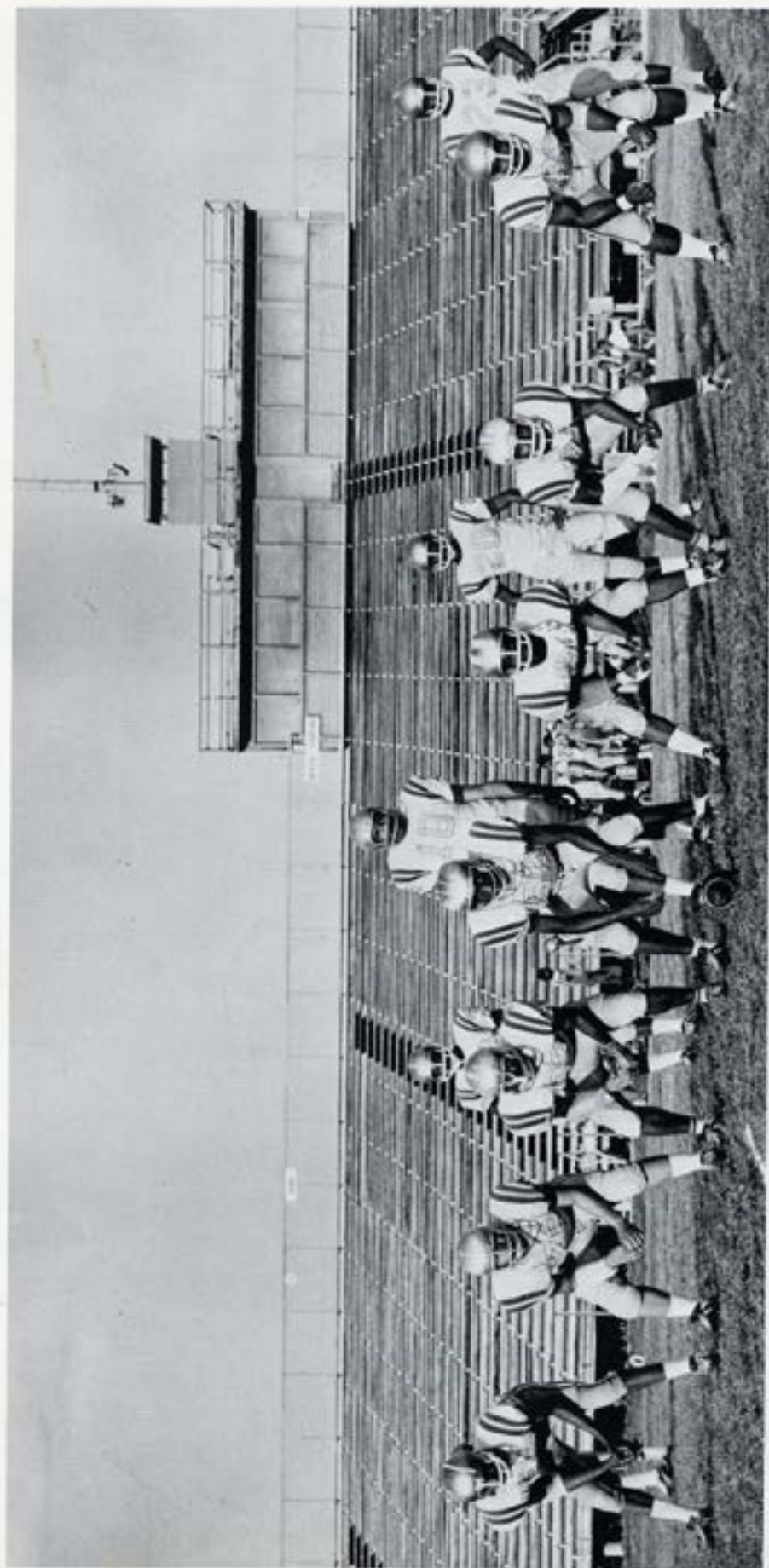

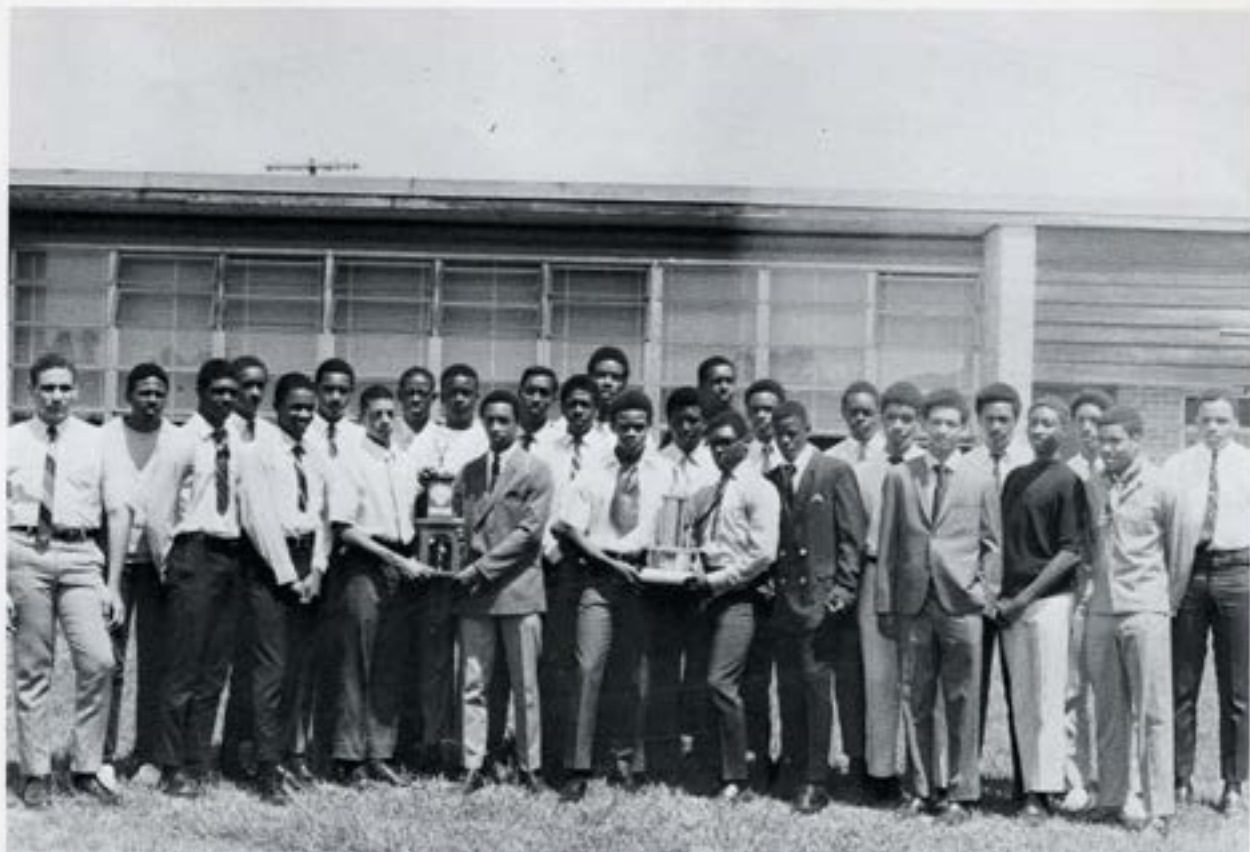

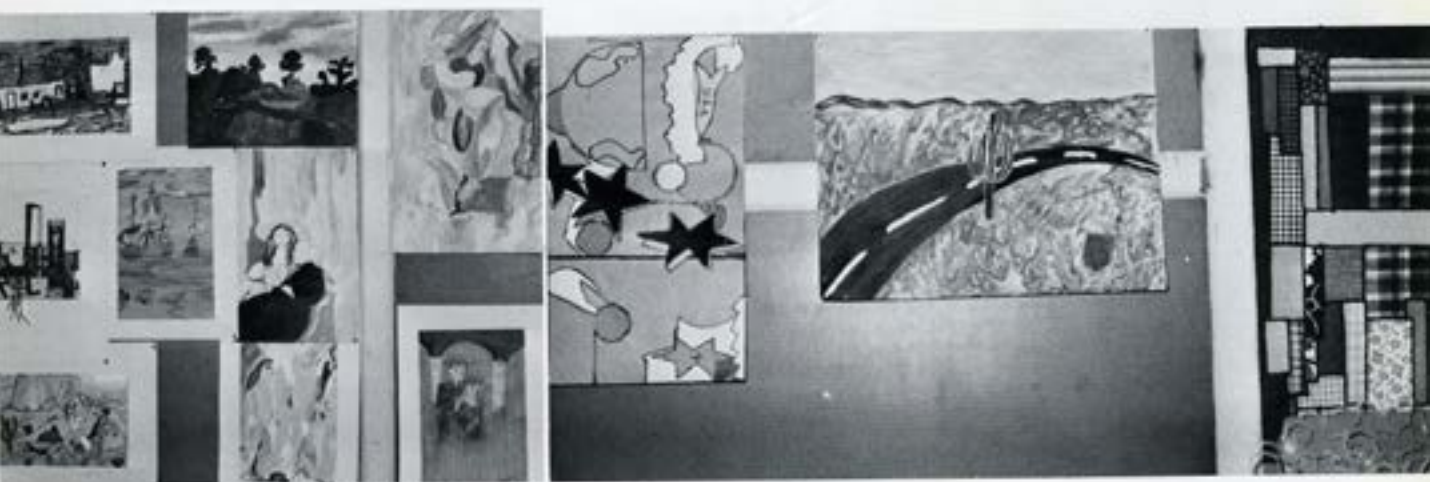

1968-69 STUDENT COUNCIL PRESIDENT, ROLAND LARTIGUE, is admired by fellow students for his high quality of leadership. He has spearheaded many worthy campaigns and he has requested for students a true voice in the administrative policies of Hebert.

In September of 1968, a new student governing body began its reign at Hebert. It was the Student Congress which replaced the long-lasting student council. The new name, Congress, means just that. Politically, the Hebert Student Congress strives to operate like the U.S. Congress. It is composed of a House of Representatives and a Senate. Two representatives from each homeroom form the membership of the House of Representatives and the officers of the Congress form the membership of the Senate.

The two-party system provides for conventions and campaigning for elections. The Blue and Gold Parties held conventions and campaigning which preceded elections last spring. Each party presented its platform and expressed that its sole purpose for existing was for the benefit of the student body. The Gold Party listed the following statements: The Congress is a servant of the student body; The Congress should create better relations between students and teachers; and The Congress should stress academic skills as well as athletic skills. The Blue Party pledged the following: To promote better teacher-student relationship; To facilitate the dining room area; To provide recreational programs and to encourage scholastic achievement.

The Gold Party won the majority of officers with the Blue Party becoming the minority party, winning only four. Yet, both parties work together for the common good. In its one year of operation at Hebert, the Student Congress can claim as its first milestone that of gaining the sincere respect and admiration of the faculty and administration. It has accomplished more than that. Recommendations in regard to many improvements around the school have been given a receptive nod by the administrative staff.

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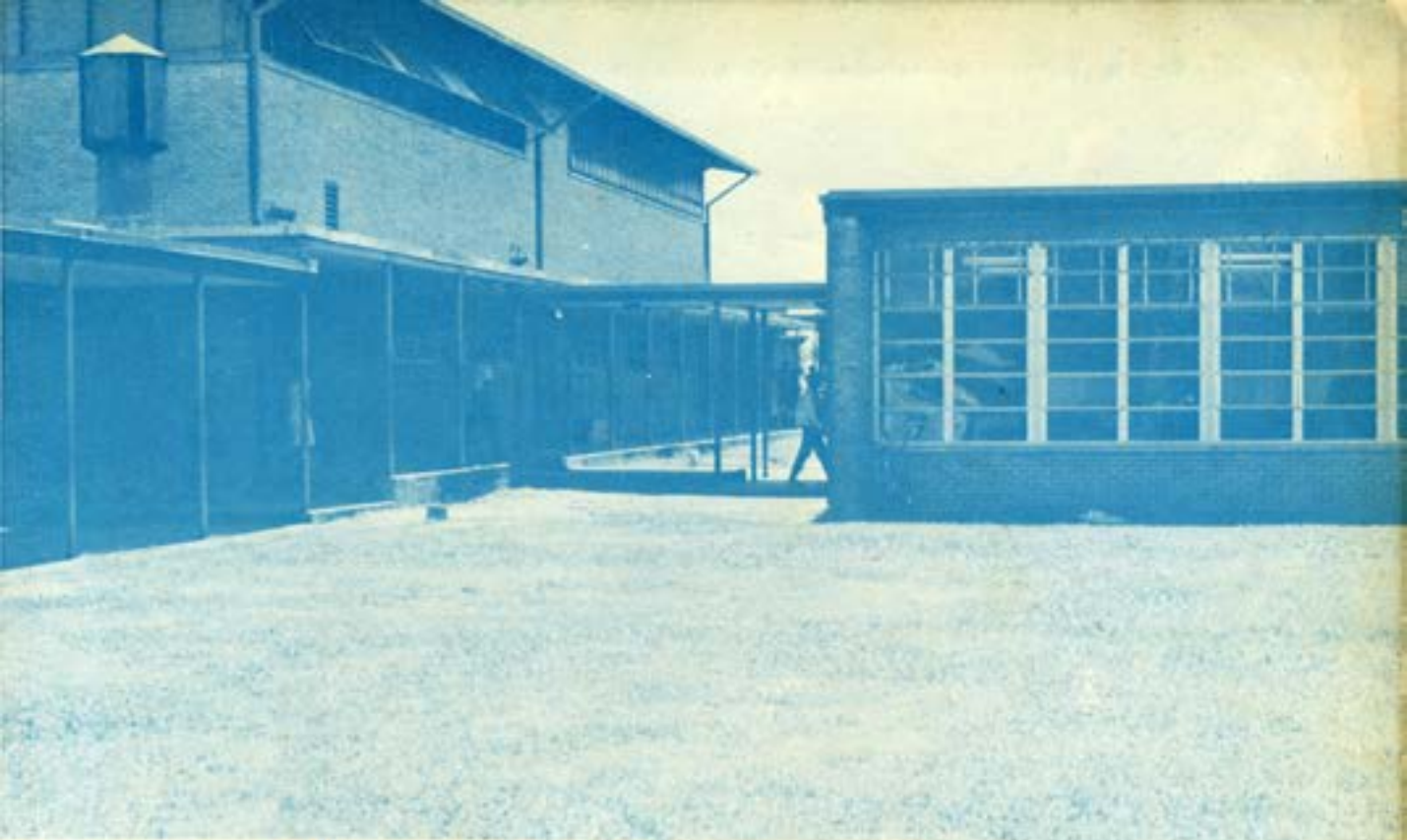
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
